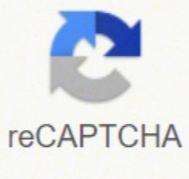

What are **Modal Verbs**?

They are **Auxiliary Verbs** that provide additional and specific meaning to the main verb of the sentence. **Modal verbs** are sometimes referred to as **Modal Auxiliary Verbs** because they help other verbs.

- CAN** → Ability, doubt, astonishment, permission, polite, request
- MAY** → Permission, supposition, with doubt, if not prohibition
- MUST** → Obligation, firm necessity, logical, conclusion, probability
- SHALL** → Intention, supposition
- WILL** → Wish, desire, will, confidence, in the future
- OUGHT TO** → Moral duty, insistent advice, strict recommendation
- NEED** → Necessity
- HAVE TO** → Unwillingness, forced circumstances
- WOULD** → Wish (wish "to like"), polite request, a habit of the past



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May / Might

may

→ We use 'may' to ask for permission. However this is rather formal and not used very often in modern spoken English.

May I help you?

→ We use 'may' to suggest something is possible.

It may rain later today.

→ We also use 'may' to express a wish.

May this year bring you happiness and health?

might

→ We use 'might' to suggest a small possibility of something. Often we read that 'might' suggests a smaller possibility than 'may'. There is in fact little difference and 'might' is more used than 'may' in spoken English.

It might rain this afternoon.

→ For the past, we use 'might have'.

We may have phoned while I was having a shower.
